Calendar of the Rose **Pruning Workshop**

Asthall Manor

Designed by Julian and Isabelle Bannerman, in their typical romantic English style, the gardens of Asthall Manor are designed to peak in high summer. The planting relies heavily on roses, summer-flowering shrubs and country-style perennials, which provide perfume and colour from June to the first frosts. The house, ballroom and the cloisters are rose-strewn and every archway and gateway supports them.

Using a technique developed by Mark Edwards, Asthalls previous Head Gardener, the roses are pruned in a style that ensure they provide as much interest during the winter months as they do when in full bloom. New growth is carefully manipulated and teased into place to build up intricate lattice work structures, creating living sculptures befitting of the venue.
